Narrative





David and Wayne walked up to the girl and introduced themselves. "Hi, I'm David King, and this is Wayne Le."

"Hi, David, hi, Wayne," the girl said. "I'm Michaela Rosas."



introduce (v) – to tell someone another person's name when they meet for the first time

"Nice to meet you, Michaela," said Wayne. "Can you tell us about your project? It looks really interesting."

"Sure," replied Michaela. "I'm from Los Angeles, but I went to Latin America a few years ago. I visited several small towns that didn't have access to clean water. The people who live there had to walk for hours every day to get water for their families. I was shocked. When I got back home, I did some research. I learned that the cost of building a water well was only \$8,000 US dollars. I know it sounds like a lot," Michaela added, "but one well can supply water for 2,000 people. That's only \$4 US dollars per person, or the price of a cup of coffee or a large cupcake in Los Angeles. Well, I love to bake, and I wanted to use my skills to help others. That's why I started Bake & Share. We bake cupcakes and use the profits to build water wells. We've built three water wells so far."

"That's awesome!" exclaimed Wayne. "My project is called—"

shocked (adj) – very surprised and upset by something bad that happens unexpectedly

Wayne was interrupted by the awards presenter. "Hello, everyone! The long-awaited moment has arrived: the announcement of the 2018 Youth Community Service Award winners. Hundreds of young people were nominated, and it was very difficult to choose only one winner. The winner is ... Daniela Soto! Daniela founded Glasses for Kids, which helps children afford eyeglasses."

Everyone began to clap, and David, Wayne, and Michaela joined in happily. "Her project sounds wonderful," beamed Michaela. "I'm so happy for her."

"Me too," agreed David. "Her project is great."

The presenter started to speak again. "Now for the winners of our under-fifteen age category: David King of Seniors Connect; Wayne Le of e-Quality, and Michaela Rosas of Bake & Share." The clapping began again.
