And for a ¹⁰ <u>short</u> time, they were very happy together.

However, when they asked Sir Walter if they could get engaged, he ¹¹ <u>was</u> very cold. He ¹² <u>did not think</u> that Captain Wentworth ¹³ <u>was</u> good enough for his family. Although Lady Russell was ¹⁴ <u>kinder</u> than Sir Walter, she too believed the engagement ¹⁵ <u>was not</u> a good idea. Anne was only ¹⁶ <u>nineteen</u> at the time. She ¹⁷ <u>was</u> beautiful and clever, and from a good family, and Lady Russell thought that she was throwing herself away.
