

1 - Podcast pick and play!

Select a podcast that aligns with your learners' interests, curriculum goals, or the current unit topic.



Set up your own Podeast Circle!



4- Podcast Voices - Time for discussion!

First, the facilitator invites three speakers to present their podcast summaries, and then, the debate begins. The facilitator reads the questions provided by the teacher and ensures that each speaker has an opportunity to contribute.



Set up your own Podeast Circle!

2 - Take notes

Have students listen to the podcast episode and make some general notes, such as a summary or the main takeaways.
