The Broader Scope of Paraphrasing – OED

which features of music could students compare when analysing two versions of the same song?

When students analyze two versions of the same song, they can compare a variety of musical features to gain insight into interpretation, style, and arrangement. Here are key features they might focus on:

1. Instrumentation and Arrangement

- · Are there differences in the texture (e.g. full band vs. acoustic)?
- . Is the arrangement more complex or more stripped down in one version?

2. Tempo and Rhythm

"Boulevard of Broken Dreams" – Green Day	Figurative language, metaphors
"Fast Car" – Tracy Chapman	Storytelling, past tense narrative
"Imagine" – John Lennon	Universal themes, idealistic tone
