- (b) Guess how Daisy Miller is connected to these people. Make three predictions about Daisy and the story, e.g. 'I think that ...'

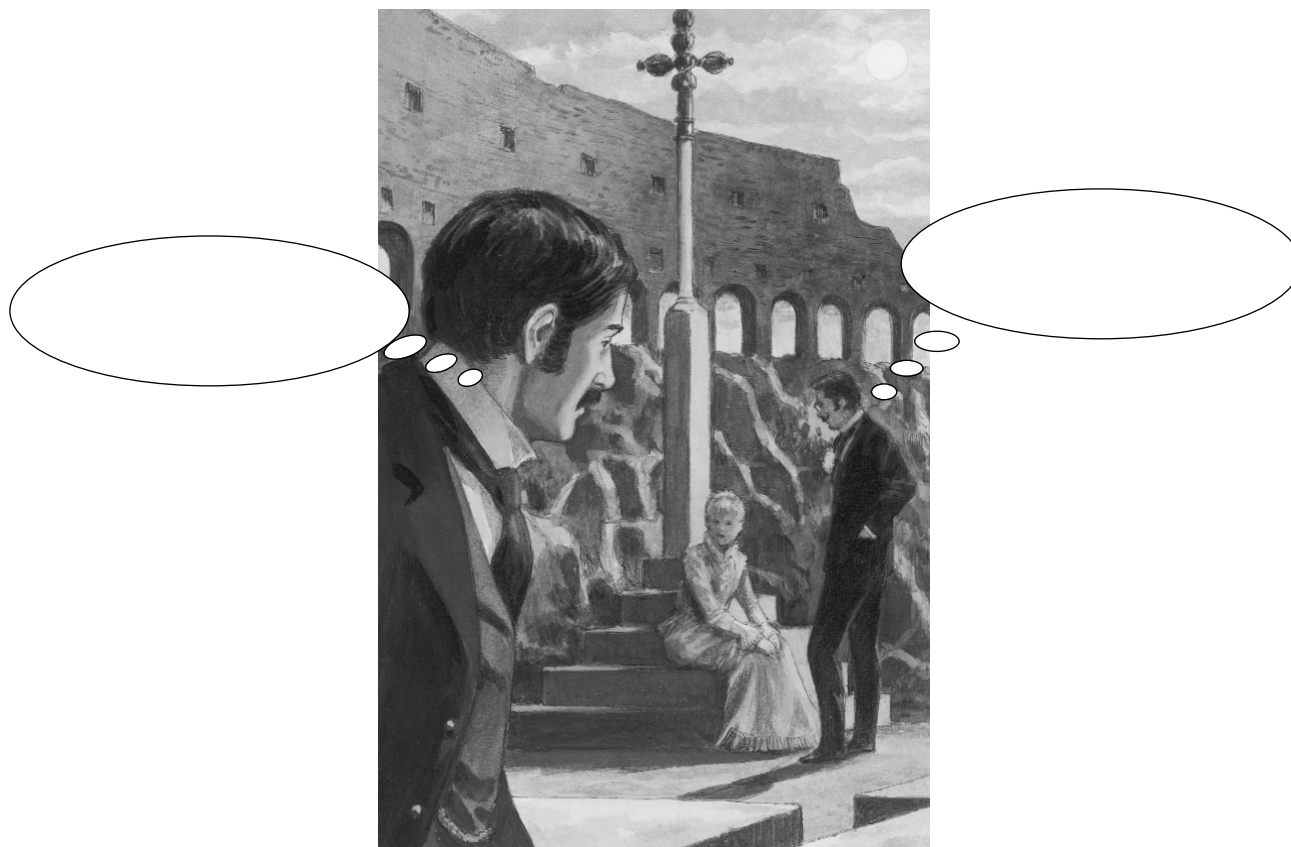
